

October Site Visit Report

Returning from Africa just last Friday, we were exhausted, but in the best possible way. As a member of the Michael's House Board of Trustees traveling with another MH member, we were excited to see first-hand our operations in both Addis Ababa, Ethiopia and in Uganda. I was not disappointed. I found Michael's House not what I expected...it was much more! My only wish is that we could have recorded (and translated!) the almost constant outpouring of thanks, prayers, and well-wishes sent on the behalf of the elderly we are serving half a world away.

One cannot spend 2 minutes at Michael's House in Addis Ababa without feeling like you are in the presence of something uniquely magical. Through the incredible passion and management of Terfa and his team, they have created an oasis of peace and comfort in stark contrast to the chaotic and hard streets just outside its gates. Over the last 2 years, they have transformed a group of 80 to 100 homeless and lonely elderly into a community that feels more like a family. Among the rewards is not only observing how the health of the individuals has improved over this time, but also how their minds have sharpened and their spirits have once again come alive.

In addition to auditing the work plan, we toured the facilities, including the craft shop where beautiful handmade textiles and baskets are being produced on a daily basis for sale. We visited Ann's Shelter, which has proved to be an excellent addition to our program. We also brought over a suitcase full of medical supplies to restock the health clinic. However, the best part was taking part in the serving of our clientele. I'm not sure who enjoyed this more...



In Uganda, we found a country decimated by years of corruption, AIDS, and civil war with little family, spiritual, or economic structures remaining. As a result, the need there is immense. While a relatively new program for Michael's House, we are already beginning to make a difference in the lives of the rural elderly living outside of Kampala. While there, we audited the work plan and met with the individuals involved in our outreach program that deals one-on-one with the elderly through weekly visitation. In addition, we toured the new farm program and discussed next steps and met with the nursing assistant to exchange supplies and discuss the best process for ongoing distribution of care.

And throughout our visits were showered with handmade gifts, prayers, thanks, and praises from the extended family that is now Michael's House. But to be sure, these were not meant for us, they were meant for you.

You have made a difference. You are changing lives. Thank you from everyone at Michael's House.




- \$84.00 (\$7.00 per month) can save the life of an elderly person in the rural parts of Africa; or

Mora is an 83 year-old woman who was a secretary at the Italian embassy in Addis for several years. She is a dignified tall woman even in the rags she wears to keep her warm. In her fluent Italian, she explained her spiral downwards to her present sad status. She had five children all of whom died as adults. Her husband got meningitis and as a result was brain damaged. She had to leave her job to take care of him. He lived for several years. When he died she took in her eldest granddaughter who later succumbed to HIV/AIDS. Mora inherited her three great grandchildren who are now aged 8, 5 and 4 years old. She lost the little room she lived in and now lives with the children under a piece of corrugated iron propped up against the wall of a bus shelter. With no pension, health care or even relatives this still dignified woman finds a little support, sustenance and above all respect at Michael's House



Mulnet Agu is an 84 year-old man who in his young days was a soldier in the army of the Emperor Haille Selasie. He never married and has no living relatives. He lives on a soldier's pension of 14 birr a month, which is about \$1.50. His eyesight is very bad and sometimes he gets lost and often mugged. Terfa (a Michael's House Volunteer) found him living in a cardboard box on the street not far from Michael's House. He was desperate, frightened and barely had the strength to fight off the wild dogs that roam the streets. Through your generosity, Michael's House is now able to provide him with one meal a day and the love and respect of community he receives at Michael's House.

Remember that Michael's House is a registered 501 C3 non-profit charitable organization. All donations are tax deductible.





GIVING THE GIFT THAT GIVES ALL YEAR LONG



This year, Michael's House would like to suggest that the gift you buy during this Holiday Season could give all year long to your family and friends. Through your previous generosity, Michael's House has been able to provide many services for our guests; however, the needs continue to grow and become more urgent each day. Please consider giving:

- "A Comfort Pack" for \$50 that will include a walking stick, pair of shoes, shawl, blanket, a man or woman's hat, soap, towel and skin lotion.
- "A Pension" for either \$84 or \$120 per year or as little as \$7 or \$10 for a month to assist an elderly person in obtaining food and a sense of well-being.
- "Craft Material Items" for \$20 to provide a guest with the means to create and sell crafts in the market place to earn money for shelter or medical care.
- "Farm Animals" you can buy a goat for \$13, a piglet for \$19, and a hen for \$ 2.75
